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LOOKING ON THE BRIGHT SIDE

The film and theatre director, Roger Michell died last month. He was best known for directing Notting Hill - the highest grossing British film ever - but professionally he was recognised for the creativity and innovativeness of his work. When asked once about what he might turn to next, he replied that he didn't really know but "I am ambitious ... what more is there?"



Self-seeking ambition can be an ugly thing to behold, but I don't think that was what Michell was suggesting. In his work and in person he expressed the conviction that no matter how uncertain the future might be there were always new possibilities to discover. He wanted to find ways to exceed expectations, his own and his audiences' too. Taken that way, 'ambition' might be something for Christians to pursue at the moment. For most people the future looks not only uncertain but threatening. Negativity casts a depressing pall. On hearing that we need to live with Covid and its consequences for some time longer, the public mood seems to have become more rather than less pessimistic. When we meet up socially, or in the street, the pub - and even in church - the conversation turns to things that have gone wrong. Promises 'they' have broken; programmes that have failed; political leaders you can't trust; restrictions we still have to live with; mistakes that "must never happen again". Understandably, it not easy to see what we can look forward to. But in a few days' time it will be Advent and for Christians that makes all the difference. Advent is about hope.

Nowadays Advent is typically seen as a time for making preparations for Christmas. Traditionally though it went much deeper than that. The four Sundays of Advent drew attention to the Four Last Things: death, judgement, hell and heaven. More immediately they related to the underlying realities of Christian experience: hope, peace, joy and love. The candles, calendars and carols give welcome relief to the darkening nights of the next few weeks. But they are only pointers, counting down the days to the celebration of Christ's coming. Advent prepares us for that celebration. It also orients Christian people towards the future generally and invites them to engage much more in what the Incarnation implies.

Of course the Advent hope is not just a concept. It does much more than encourage positive thinking though Christian thinking should be constructive in times of uncertainty and fear. Hope gives a different set of bearings to see ahead to where we are heading - theologically, socially, politically, and personally. We are ambitious. There are things to look forward to and work towards. As John the Baptist's declares: "Prepare the way of the Lord ... the kingdom of heaven is coming upon you."

Always Remembered



The Holy Rood church at Daglingworth indicates the death of Charlie Tibbles in the 1914-18 war and his son Jack Tibbles in the 1939-45 conflict. Charlie was my maternal grandfather and Jack was his son. Grandmother Helen Tibbles lost her husband in the First World War and her son in the Second. She had a daughter (my mother) who was forced to leave a prize-winning career at the Grammar school as it was expensive and money was needed at home.

Gran was never bitter, she was proud of the military service and sacrifice of her husband and son and was a vigorous supporter of the British Legion.

In 1951 I started my spell at Cirencester Grammar School. We lived at Eycot, a scattering of cottages high above the Cheltenham Road at Rendcomb. It was a long, steep walk from the Rendcomb bus stop. When the clocks went back at the end of October, it was a dark walk as well! It was decided that from Monday to Friday I would lodge with Gran at Daglingworth, saving me the long uphill walk. It would be company for Gran.

It was in the first week in November and I got off the bus from Cirencester in the centre of Daglingworth and, as it pulled away, I saw Gran coming down the Duntisbourne Road. She had been selling poppies for Remembrance Day and had the poppy tray round her neck.

She saw me and quickened her step to join me. She did not quite get to me; falling with a stroke from which she died two days later. As she fell the poppies from her tray blew across the centre of Daglingworth. I hope they were the last earthly things she saw.

I learned lessons from my Gran I still remember. Loyalty and service are two of them, add example and love and you will know why I think there should be a third name on that war memorial.

Remembrance Day Remembered.

The first two-minute silence held in London (11 November 1919) was reported in the *Manchester Guardian* on 12 November 1919:

The first stroke of eleven produced a magical effect.

The tram cars glided into stillness, motors ceased to cough and fume, and stopped dead, and the mighty-limbed dray horses hunched back upon their loads and stopped also, seeming to do it of their own volition. Someone took off his hat, and with a nervous hesitancy the rest of the men bowed their heads also. Here and there an old soldier could be detected slipping unconsciously into the posture of 'attention'. An elderly woman, not far away, wiped her eyes, and the man beside her looked white and stern. Everyone stood very still ... The hush deepened. It had spread over the whole city and become so pronounced as to impress one with a sense of audibility. It was a silence which was almost pain ... And the spirit of memory brooded over it all.



From the October edition of the Ciren Parish Magazine 1915

The Parish Magazine of St Andrew's Plymouth, contains an interesting letter from the Revd R H Fulford, who is acting as Chaplain to the Forces in the Dardanelles:

"Services in the trenches," he says, "are difficult to arrange, as we are under constant fire. Yet I have administered the Sacrament in my dug-out to as many as the place would comfortably hold, and we have often spoken to men individually and in small groups in the firing line itself, and, of course, at the fixed ambulance station. Here there is a large natural cave, and on Sunday evening it was good to hear 'Abide with me' sung by a large number of men, with the shells rattling overhead. We had a wonderful service in the dark just before landing on the Peninsula, and it gave us the greater courage to meet the heavy shell fire which greeted us. Any day you may see men openly reading their New Testaments in the trenches and elsewhere, and many and earnest prayers are said from the heart. Last week I was burying a fellow when the Corporal told me that the fatigue party, of which the dead man had been one, after a heavy shelling had gone down on their knees and thanked God for their escape. *We live here on the threshold of two worlds much more consciously than in everyday life, and England will be the better for the return of her Army in the present spirit.* Of course, there are dull and foolish ones even in the tightest corners; but, at any rate, the question of life and death has to be faced, and in most cases the religious answer carries conviction and comfort."

Cirencester Street Pastors

In February 2011 the first patrol of Cirencester Street Pastors went out on the streets of central Cirencester. Patrols continued every Saturday night/Sunday morning until stopped during the Lockdown restrictions. Trial patrols over the last two weekends of August have convinced the trustees that there is still a need for Street Pastors in Cirencester.



During Lockdown a number of Street Pastors resigned, and others are currently unavailable because of health reasons. As a result there are only 11 Street Pastors available for duty, which means we will only be able to send out a team two weekends a month, to avoid individuals patrolling more than once a month.

Obviously, we need to recruit new Street Pastors. By far the most **successful** recruitment drive took place when Rev Les Isaac, the founder of Street Pastors and current CEO of their governing body, Ascension Trust, spoke at a special Churches Together in Cirencester (CTiC) service at the Baptist church, then in Coxwell Street, in January 2010. At that time 30 people volunteered to train as Street Pastors and even more volunteered to be Prayer Pastors. Since that date Cirencester Street Pastors have been a very visible and successful initiative of CTiC.

We are hoping to arrange another special CTiC service, with an invitation to Les Isaac to return and speak again, with a view to recruiting members of our congregations to volunteer to train as Street Pastors. This will probably be in mid-2022 at the earliest, but we need to shout out for recruits right now.

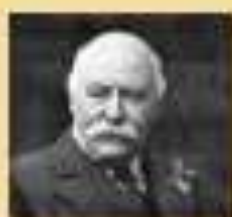
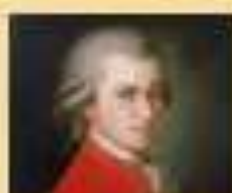

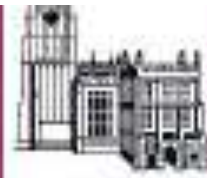
