Well, I find myself on a rather wet and dreary Saturday morning writing this article for our magazine. I can't quite believe that we only have 37 days until Christmas! The year has flown by, the diary seems full with lots of celebrations and events not only in the Parish Church but in the town and throughout the various organisations I find myself involved with.

Reflecting back on the year that has been, it has been one of the more challenging years and with all that has taken place how appreciative I am of those around me who have continued to enable me to fulfil the task of Ministry that has been entrusted to me. To this end I am extremely grateful for the team of colleagues both lay and ordained who give so much of themselves for the life of our parish. When I stop to consider all that goes on in this place, I am amazed and humbled.



During this Kingdom Season, I have been reflecting on what I need to let go of in order to make space for the King of Kings. The Church of England's theme this year is 'Follow the Star'. The great invitation for people to come and join with us for the Advent and Christmas celebration.

Musings in Mark

Mark 2:14 *As he walked along, he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax collector's booth. "Follow me," Jesus told him, and Levi got up and followed him.*

We all have people we look up to, whether we like their style of dressing, their character or their hair style! Role models are also important as children grow up giving some sense of potential and hope. Role models also change as we go through our various stages of life. For Levi, a hated tax collector, considered a quisling by the Jews oppressed by the Roman occupation, he probably didn't have good role models to look up to.

Yet, all who are despised in their community have a yearning to be affirmed for who they are, if not for what they do.

Levi had certainly heard of Jesus, the whole community was buzzing and Levi was probably curious about a man who generated such interest. In Matthew's gospel (the other name of Levi, so his own story!) Jesus was teaching on the lakeside, so Levi/Matthew could hear.

"Follow me!" was the call as Jesus passed by him, a call incidentally he makes to all of us, and so Levi did! But not just following. He was excited enough to bring all his fellow tax collectors and friends to a meal for Jesus. He had found someone who affirmed him for who he was and also gave him a vision of what life could be like and how he too could grow into the fullness of his manhood.

We don't hear a lot about him, but he writes a cracking gospel, full of teaching, hope and vision. Matthew tells us so much about Jesus, defining for Jewish readers the coming Messiah and the King. Lives were changed, and even to this day Jesus continues to be life changing as we too choose to follow.

Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswolds share tips for how to save money on your energy bills

As people across Stroud and Cotswolds Districts face another winter of high energy bills, Citizens Advice shares how small changes can make a big difference when it comes to saving energy and lowering costs.

The charity has teamed up with the Energy Saving Trust to share advice on getting help if you are struggling with energy bills and tips on how to cut energy costs around the home.

People can make simple changes to save money on their energy bills and don't need to wait until the colder months to do so. These include:

- Washing clothes at 30°C could save around £15 per year - and reducing the number of wash cycles by one per week could save a further £15.
- Reducing shower time to four minutes could save a typical household as much as £75 a year.
- Swapping one bath a week for a four-minute shower could save an average of £17 a year.
- Avoiding overfilling the kettle could save around £12 a year on electricity.
- Draught-proofing windows and doors will help your home feel warmer and could save around £50 a year on bills.
- Turning appliances off at the wall/plug when you're not using them could save an average of £60 a year.
- Turning the thermostat down by 1°C could save around £115 a year.

Installing a Smart Meter can help people get better control of their energy use and budgets. Smart meters come with an In-home Display Unit (IHD) that shows how much you're using and its cost, almost as you use it – in real time. The government has instructed all energy suppliers to offer households a smart meter by 2025. You don't have to

have one but may benefit from reduced tariffs with some suppliers. The government estimates that customers with smart meters save an average of £50 a year.

Check you're getting all the support you're entitled to...

Lifestyle changes won't be possible for everyone and may not be enough to cover the hole in household budgets caused by higher prices, so Citizens Advice is also urging people to check they're getting all the support they're entitled to. This could include:

- Checking what benefits you're entitled to by using a benefits calculator
- Warm Home Discount — a £150 annual discount if you get certain benefits
- Cold weather payments — payments if you get certain benefits and the weather is extremely cold
- Grants from your energy supplier — to help you pay off debts you may owe

Teresa died in September and her memorial service was held in the Parish Church on 23rd October. Howard Gray included two of her earlier poems in the November parish magazine.

She was a regular contributor to our magazine for many years, writing intelligent and relevant poems. One of her last poems was concerned with the devastating effects of the Covid epidemic, and is reproduced below:

Recycle your Christmas Tree with Longfield

Get organised and book your Christmas tree collection before you've even cooked the turkey.

For a voluntary donation, you'll get your tree whisked away by Longfield's team of volunteers and taken to recycling sites where it will be chipped into mulch, then scattered on pathways and car parks at Painswick Rococo Garden.

Last year, Longfield collected 3,000 trees from the Stroud, Cirencester and Gloucester districts in just three days, and raised nearly £50,000 for essential hospice care. This year, they're aiming to beat last year's record – costs of care are rising and they need every penny to provide free hospice care for dying people and their families, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Longfield couldn't run this scheme without the support of dozens of local businesses and volunteers who donate vans and drivers during the collection period.

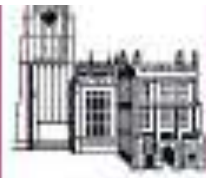
