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## **A Musician On Tour**

Some of you may know that I recently went on tour with the Freiburger Domsingknaben (the Freiburg Cathedral boys' choir) for two weeks. Tours always sound glamorous and exciting, but is that really the case? What makes these long trips away from home so special?

It is exciting to be able to visit and perform in new places. Our tour was comprised of visits to Coventry, Liverpool, Lichfield, Birmingham, Selby/York, Guildford and London, with time to explore each place included. I have to admit to having particularly fallen in love with Lichfield and Liverpool.

Singing in these incredible buildings really was a privilege, and the audiences/congregations were warm, friendly and appreciative. As organist, I especially enjoyed playing these instruments – some of which I had dreamt of playing for several years.

The music itself was wonderful too. We performed concerts, evensongs and services with a range of music by Bach, Stanford, Bruckner and Fauré. The high point was singing for the Saturday mass in Westminster Cathedral, where the acoustic was fabulous, and the general atmosphere was electric; I don't think I'd ever heard Bruckner's *Os Justi* sound so beautiful or emotionally charged before.

Then there is the camaraderie. On tour, you are constantly making new memories with friends, old and new. Whether it was taking selfies in front of Tower Bridge, singing German folk songs in restaurants, or playing table football in the break between rehearsal and concert, it was

wonderful to spend time with the group and to not just be performing the whole time.

You get to know people on tours, what makes them tick, what little habits they have. But it's more than that too. By creating these special memories together, you share something that is unique to you, as a group and as friends.

On the other hand, the accommodation is sometimes less than glamorous. It very much depends on the type of tour and budget that you're playing with. I can't imagine Taylor Swift ends up sharing a boarding school shower room with her tour bus driver... We spent a lot of our time at Denstone College which (despite the shower arrangements) was comfortable and practical for our needs. The accommodation highlight came when some of the older members of the group ended up staying in Guildford Premier Inn whilst the rest of the choir stayed in the Surrey University student dorms.

A lot of time was spent on the tour bus, and I discovered just how maneuverable those things can be when the occasion calls for it.

How do I sum up being a musician on tour? Like everything, there are ups and downs. Some performances go better than others, some venues are nicer and sometimes you end up clinging for dear life as the tour bus rounds a tight roundabout at something close to light speed. But it is all worth it, as it is the performances that do go well that matter. It is the opportunity to perform in wonderful new spaces that matters. And above all, it is the people that you are with that make it truly special.

## Musings in Mark



Mark 5:15 NIV

*[15] When they came to Jesus, they saw the man who had been possessed by the legion of demons, sitting there, dressed and in his right mind; and they were afraid.*

We forget how focused Jesus can become when his father directs him. The only reason he sailed with his disciples to the region of the Gerasenes was to minister to this poor demonised man. Perhaps the storm during the approach was caused by Satan to hinder this incredible healing.

The man showed immense signs of mental illness resulting in inhuman strength, nudity, isolation and self-harm with a choice of living among the dead rather than the living.

Even in the biblical account we find his illness defines him, and we don't ever learn his name except that defined by his demonic host. Yet there is hope in all these situations. Even he, in his incredible pain, still recognises Jesus and falls on his knees before him.

The spirit speaks and bargains with Jesus to avoid being sent away from their "home" area, which might have something to say to us regarding "uncomfortable" places.

Jesus agrees to their inhabiting pigs - a banned meat for Jews, but we are in a gentile area - and the pigs are drowned. A sign perhaps of what can happen to people in these circumstances.

I think the main thing I get from this tale is that Jesus did not condemn the man's self-harm although he did change his behaviour. Secondly, Jesus was not afraid to approach the man, even though others were. He did not cast him out or chain him up but restored the man to community, firstly with Jesus himself and later with those who had been scared of him. There is also an interesting connection between self-harm and the pigs in that self-harm is a visible sign that we are hurting and Jesus gave a physical sign (the pigs drowning) of being healed.

The most fascinating thing for me, is how the healing of this man, seated, clothed and in his right mind, frightened the locals who then wanted Jesus out of their lives, which he did by immediately returning across the lake to Capernaum.

We have a mighty Saviour who can deal with anything, it frightens some but encourages those who follow him.

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## **The Electoral Roll**

Joining the Parish Electoral Roll gives those worshipping in our parish the chance to vote for members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and Deanery Synod, or even stand for election themselves.



To be considered for election to the PCC, a parishioner needs to have been on the Electoral Roll for a minimum of six months and to have worshipped for that time in the parish.

Every six years the Diocese of Gloucester requires us to revise the whole roll completely to ensure it is up to date. This means that everyone will need to submit a new form, if they wish to be on the roll. The current Electoral Roll will close on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2025.

A new roll will be opened prior to the APCM scheduled for April 30<sup>th</sup>. The new role will temporarily be closed and presented at the 2025 APCM.

Following the APCM the role will be open for members to be added as per the usual requirement of 6 months habitual attendance.

If your name is listed on the current roll there is no rush to reapply, But you will need to submit a new form before the end of March 2025. If you are not on the current roll and would consider standing for election at the April 2025 APCM then please submit a form as soon as you can.

If you have any questions about the Electoral Roll then please contact me.

Electoral Roll forms are available in all our churches, together with a form that gives you permission to use your contact details should you wish to receive details of parish events etc. (This is the General Data Protection Regulations form). Your form can be returned to me either through the Churchwardens or in an envelope addressed to me and left in the Parish Forum. ## St Francis of Assisi



October 4th is the Saint's day of St. Francis of Assisi.

Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone (c. 1181 – 3 October 1226), known as Francis of Assisi, was an Italian mystic, poet, and Catholic friar who founded the religious order of the Franciscans. He was born into a

wealthy family but had a vision which inspired him to lead a Christian life of poverty. He became a beggar and itinerant preacher.

He was canonized by Pope Gregory IX on 16 July 1228. He is commonly portrayed wearing a brown habit with a rope tied around his waist, featuring three knots symbolizing the three Franciscan vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

In 1219, he went to Egypt in an attempt to convert the sultan al-Kamil and put an end to the conflict of the Fifth Crusade. In 1223, he arranged for the first live nativity scene as part of the annual Christmas celebration in Greccio.

He founded the men's Order of Friars Minor, the women's Order of St. Clare, the Third Order of St. Francis and the Custody of the Holy Land. Once his community was authorized by Pope Innocent III, he withdrew increasingly from external affairs.

Francis is associated with patronage of animals and the environment. It became customary for churches to hold ceremonies blessing animals on his feast day of the fourth of October, which became World Animal Day. Along with Catherine of Siena, he was designated patron saint of Italy. He is also the namesake of the city of San Francisco.

## **The Long Table secures new home in Cirencester**

Gloucestershire community kitchen, The Long Table — along with other Stroud community projects — has secured a new home to continue its mission of making good food accessible to everyone, after its Stroud venue was sold in February 2024.



Brimscombe Mill's community hub charities, including The Long Table, have secured a new home in Gloucestershire, with work starting at a site in Cirencester. The Stroud-based community kitchen is set to open its brand-new venue inside the old House of Fraser building, which has been vacant since 2019.

Having been running for six years, The Long Table started at Brimscombe Mill, serving up lunch and dinner, as well as coffee and cake, to those in need of a good meal and some good company.

A lifeline for many, the organisation runs on a pay-as-you-can basis, meaning the food provided is accessible to everyone, regardless of means.

Its Stroud site also hosts Kids Stuff, Stroud Furniture Bank and the Grace Network, and their futures were called into question when the Brimscombe Mill was sold in February 2024.

Co-founder of The Long Table, Tom Herbert, said: 'We see that there's an appetite for what we offer, [but] there's a need for what we do and

there's people to hire, [too].

'It feels very close to our heart and we can't wait to get open here. Amazing things happen when we eat together.'

The Bike Drop is also confirmed to be moving to the new House of Fraser site, with its workshop manager, Jason Howarth, adding: 'Half of our business is refurbishing donated bikes, so that we can get people on bikes that aren't disgustingly expensive.'

'It's not just about the charitable efforts we go to, it's also ensuring that people around here have somewhere to go for a good workshop.'

Although the opening date is still to be confirmed, The Long Table Cirencester and The Bike Drop are predicted to open doors at the end of October 2024.

The Brimscombe Mill site is still open to the public, for now, with events planned into the autumn.

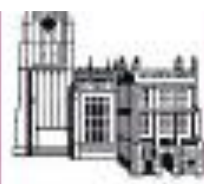
